Institute for Expressive Analysis (IEA)

Founded in 1978, the Institute for Expressive Analysis is a New York State license-granting institute dedicated to the exploration and application of creativity in the processing and analysis of the transferencecountertransference continuum in psychoanalysis. Our goal is to help each candidate in training discover their own evolving definition of what it means to think and work creatively.

Our training focuses on building a solid clinical background useful for both institutional work and independent practice. Along with an emphasis on our belief that by definition therapy should be both an intellectual and creative medium, we provide a thorough understanding of developmental, technical, and practical issues. Students apply these fundamentals of clinical work to a wide range of therapeutic situations, incorporating both verbal and, if and when appropriate, nonverbal approaches.

Because no single theoretical framework can encompass the complexity of depth-oriented treatment, the Institute offers a wide range of approaches culled from object relations theory, self-psychology, relational psychoanalysis, intersubjective theory, Jungian theory, and modem Freudian psychoanalytic theory. Additionally, there is an ongoing dialogue with current developments in contemporary psychoanalytic thinking, including brain research and attachment theory.

We invite LMSWs, LCSWs and others who have completed a minimum of a master's degree to apply to the institute. Our aim is to help each student discover and develop his or her own unique style of working.

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The Psychoanalytic Training Institute of The New York Freudian Society (PTI of NYFS)

The Psychoanalytic Training Institute of the New York Freudian Society (PTI of NYFS) offers a variety of programs in both New York City and Washington DC for students interested in adult psychoanalysis, child psychoanalysis, psychoanalytic psychotherapy, and parent-infant treatment. It is a Component Institute of the International Psychoanalytical Association (IPA).

Our Adult Psychoanalysis Programs and our Child and Adolescent Psychoanalysis Program are informed by post-Freudian developments and theoretical perspectives, as well as by current research on infant development and attachment. We have a modern Freudian curriculum that places analytic listening at the center of the learning process. Seasoned clinician-instructors present detailed clinical material that includes how they as analysts thought and felt as they made choices as to what to address in the hour. Within this rich and complex context, candidates learn to listen to a wide range of clinical material from multiple vantage points and at many levels.

The **Adult Psychoanalysis Programs** in New York are offered in two tracks: **Track A** is for clinicians who have a New York State license in the fields of psychiatry, psychology, social work, or nursing (as a nurse practitioner); **Track B** (pending approval by NYSED) is for applicants who are interested in a certificate of completion in order to qualify to apply to the New York State Department of Education for a license in psychoanalysis (LP). Applicants for Track B may include clinicians who are licensed creative arts therapists, licensed mental health counselors, or licensed marriage and family therapists, as well as graduates of other master's and doctoral programs who have a strong interest in psychoanalysis.

The **Adult Psychoanalysis Program in Washington** is designed to enable candidates who live in other geographical locations, or who have schedules that preclude taking weekly classes, to train in a program that meets from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on 12 Saturdays each academic year. (Please note that this program will not qualify applicants to apply for the LP credential in New York.)

The **Anni Bergman Parent-Infant Training Program**, designed for the graduate analyst or advanced psychoanalytic candidate, is offered in New York in collaboration with the Institute for Psychoanalytic Training and Research (IPTAR).

For the student interested in **Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy**, we offer a two-year program involving coursework and supervised counseling or therapy in New York. Applicants must hold a license in New York State such as a PhD, LMSW, LCSW, or be a psychiatric nurse clinician, or hold a license that includes conducting psychotherapy in the scope of practice, such as the LCAT.

Our **Explorations Program**, also in New York, is a one-year sequence of classes designed for those who want to learn more about the principles of the psychodynamic therapies.

The Institute for Contemporary Psychotherapy

Four-Year Program in Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy

The Institute for Contemporary Psychotherapy (ICP) was founded in 1971, and was granted a provisional charter by the Regents of the University of the State of New York in September of 1973. The institute received its permanent charter on January 8, 1978, and it is presently incorporated as a nonprofit corporation.

The aims of ICP are to provide training in psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy for qualified professionals and to provide, at moderate cost, the full range of psychotherapeutic services and a research setting in which knowledge of the psychotherapeutic process can be advanced.

It is our philosophy that the development of treatment skill and competence can best be carried out in a setting in which the continued personal growth of the therapist is fostered. The program therefore emphasizes the development of personal awareness, as well as the development of technical skills and theoretical knowledge. Courses are offered from a variety of theoretical and clinical perspectives, including Freud, Sullivan, object relations, dreamwork, self-psychology, relational theory, and development from infancy to older adults.

In addition to our adult treatment division, there are divisions for the treatment of trauma, children and adolescents, family and couples, persons with eating disorders, older adults, artists, groups, and gay and lesbian affirmative psychotherapy. Candidates have the opportunity to work in these divisions and accrue hours towards the requirement for graduation.

Candidates are assigned patients from the Institute's clinical services which provide psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy for a current population of over 600, a third of them seen more than once a week. Professional treatment staff currently number over 150. In addition, there are over 100 supervisors and faculty members. Considerable attention is given to both the development of a treatment plan and to the suitability of the therapist for the particular patient and problem under consideration.

Two-Year Evening Program in Contemporary Psychodynamic Psychotherapy

ICP's Two-Year Program in Contemporary Psychodynamic Psychotherapy is a convenient evening program designed to provide an intensive learning experience combining course work, individual and group supervision, patient contact and individual psychoanalytic psychotherapy.

The program starts in September and consists of two semesters of fifteen weeks each. Classes meet on Tuesday evenings from 6:00 to 9:15 p.m., with participants attending one clinical course, one theoretical course, and one group supervision course. The coursework covers the essential concepts of psychoanalytic psychotherapy with an emphasis on clinical appli-cation. Through class work and supervision, participants will be helped to develop their understanding of patients, their capacity for effective therapeutic communication, and their ability for use of self in the treatment setting.

Each student will work with two patients in weekly psychotherapy. Students may be assigned patients from the institute's clinic and be paid on a fee-per-session basis. Upon approval of their supervisors, students may opt instead to Continued on page 5

The New York School for Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis

The New York School for Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis, now in its fourth decade, takes a dynamic approach to the understanding of emotional problems and strives for excellence in teaching, clinical service to the community and professional development.

NYSPP recognizes that psychoanalytic psychotherapy is a distinct professional discipline within the mental health field and requires its own rigorous training. The school's training program is based on contemporary theory which integrates the perspective of psychosexual development and ego psychology with the contributions of object relations, conflict theory and self-psychology. This blend of proven, contemporary theory provides a dynamic and clear understanding of the human mind. Graduates complete their training with the skills necessary to evaluate and treat a wide range of patient problems.

NYSPP's three-year program is relevant and oriented to the needs of clinicians who practice in a variety of settings. Classes meet in Manhattan on Monday evening for two fifteen-week seminars over three years.

NYSPP offers a training program in psychoanalysis for qualified candidates of the New York School for Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis and other applicants whose previous clinical experience and studies indicate an interest and readiness to engage in additional training. The course of study is unique in that it recognizes that those who have a solid foundation in the practice of psychoanalytic psychotherapy are excellent candidates for continuing their studies to become psychoanalysts. The NYSPP Psychoanalytic Program is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Psychoanalytic Education.

NYSPP maintains Clinical Services on Long Island, Westchester, New Jersey, and New York City. An annually published membership directory facilitates networking and referrals.

NYSPP has an active Alumni Association which sponsors major professional meetings open to the public. It also hosts smaller meetings for members and candidates, and special workshops and seminars for on-going learning.

NYSPP has an absolute charter from the Board of Regents of the State of New York to provide educational training in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis.

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

work with patients from private practice or work settings.


Every student will participate in one group and one individual supervision session weekly with a program supervisor. Students are expected to be in psychoanalytic psychotherapy at least once weekly, starting with their first semester.

Graduates are eligible to apply to the four year analytic program. If accepted, they may receive credit and start in the second year of the four year program.

In addition to the formal program, students learn by participating in the environment of a vital institute. ICP provides a lecture series, trauma and sexuality workshops and the opportunity to be part of a professional community.

The Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Study Center is dedicated to using multiple theoretical perspectives to provide high-level training in psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy to psychologists, social workers and other qualified mental health practitioners. While the curriculum and study environment are formulated to provide a solid grounding in basic psychoanalytic theory, PPSC operates from the premise that psychoanalytic training is enriched by exposure to all major theoretical orientations. The study environment challenges the candidate to compare and integrate significant contributions of all major orientations: contemporary Freudian analysis, modern psychoanalysis, object relations, self-psychology, relational, interpersonal, and intersubjective theory.
